1. In 1953, Hooper was a favoured young man. Explain

Ans: Hooper was a favoured young man in 1953. A six foot tall football player Hooper was favorite of all. He had played in the university football team. He was a hardworking, a hard charging Zone Sales Manager for a Chemical Company.

Ans: Charles Hooper is a character who reflects the values of fellow feeling, gratitude and self-support. He recognizes the support of his dog in his recovery. He has a fellow feeling for Duke the dog. He understands the importance of self – support, determination and strong willpower. He had met with an accident and received injuries in brain leading to subdural hemorrhage. Due to confinement in bed, he had a bout of depression. His wife tried to help him in his bad time but the role of Duke, his dog, is remarkable. Duke proved a nurse for him. Charles also reciprocated Duke's help. He was grateful to him. He dedicated his promotion to Duke as a tribute.

2. Charles Hooper is the protagonist of the story, A Dog Named Duke but the real hero is Duke, the dog. Support your answer with appropriate reasons. **8**

Ans: There is no doubt Charles Hooper is the protagonist of the story 'A Dog Named Duke' but the real hero is Duke, the dog. The title itself supports the above statement.
